This week our spot light is on Mrs Swinfield-Wells and Mrs O'Connor.





Attendance

What if my child needs to miss school?

Parents and carers have a legal duty to ensure your child gets a full time-education. Usually, that means going into school from the age of 5 to 16.

There are only a small number of circumstances where missing a school day is permitted. Your child must attend every day that the school is open, unless:

- Your child is too ill to attend.
- You have asked in advance and been given permission by the school for your child to be absent on a specific day due to exceptional circumstances.
- Your child cannot go to school on a specific day because they are observing a religious event.
- Your local authority is responsible for arranging your child's transport to school and it's not available or has not been provided yet.
- Your child does not have a permanent address and you are required to travel for work.
 This exception only applies if your child attends their usual school or another school
 where you are staying as often as possible. This must be 200 half days or more a year if
 they are aged 6 or older.

These are the only circumstances where schools can permit your child to be absent.





Flu Jabs—Reception—Year 5

Please find attached to this week's Newsletter the information to register your child for their Flu Jab. **Only parents of Reception to Year 5 children need to do this.**

This vaccination is recommended to help protect your child against flu. Flu can be an unpleasant illness and sometimes causes serious complications. Vaccinating your child will also help protect more vulnerable family and friends by preventing the spread of flu. All the information you need to consent to your child having their Flu Jab is in the letter.

CLEAN uniform, pants, socks or tights.


These donations will help re-stock our preloved uniform which will then be available to you through the year.
